Four-Year Plan Instructions:

- Print your name, ID#, school year, endorsement choice, and focus area at the top
- Circle or highlight all four years of:
 - o English I, II, III, and IV including the level (regular, PAP, AP, Dual Credit, IB)
 - Math including level. The order of the courses is Alg I, Geom, Algebra II plus 1 2 additional courses that may be selected from the courses in the course catalog.
 - Science including level. Students may select from the list of science courses in the course catalog. However, prior to graduation, they must complete Biology and either IPC, Chemistry, or Physics, and two additional credits.
 - Social Studies Most endorsements only require three social studies to include U.S. History, Government, and Economics. If your child is going to take four s/s courses, select World Geography 9th grade and World History 10th grade. If your child is only going to take one additional s/s course, select World History for either 9th or 10th grade. Include the level.
- Now write in the four courses 9th-10th grade included in your endorsement. You will need to refer to the course catalog for the exact coherent sequence.
- Write in any extra-curricular activities in which you would like to participate in grades 9
 12.
- I.E. athletics (name the sport), band, dance, ROTC, etc.)
- If you are in Spanish I currently, you will need to take Spanish II in 9th grade.
- At some point in grades 9-12 you must write in
 - Health .5 year
 - Professional Communications .5 year
 - Fine Arts (refer to the course catalog for a list of courses) 1.0 year
 - P.E. for a total of 1.0 credit (Other courses such as athletics, Band, ROTC, Cheer, and Dance team will fulfill the credit)
 - World Languages You must complete 2.0 credits of the same world language.
- Once all of these courses are written in or selected, all other blank spaces may be used for electives.

Four-year plans will be used to assist students during registration each year. These plans may be changed when students meet with their counselor annually. Remember, the four-year plan is simply a guide to assist students with 9th grade course registration and is not set in stone.
